
# Organizing Schools For Improvement: Lessons From Chicago

In the wake of the Chicago Public Schools (CPS) strike of 2012, a number of reforms were implemented in an effort to improve the district's schools. One of the most significant of these reforms was the creation of a new school governance model, known as the Network for School Improvement (NSI). The NSI is a non-profit organization that provides support and resources to schools in the CPS system, with a focus on improving student achievement.

The NSI is organized into 26 networks, each of which is responsible for a group of schools in a particular geographic area. Each network is led by a network chief, who is responsible for overseeing the network's operations and providing support to the schools within the network. 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The NSI provides a number of services to schools in the CPS system, including:

- Professional development: The NSI offers a variety of professional development opportunities for teachers and administrators, including workshops, training programs, and coaching.




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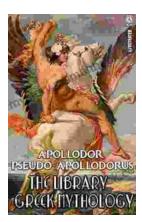
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
